# Background

- Woodstock Accessibility Advisory Committee (WAAC) has previously consulted with / met with the following groups regarding improving accessibility:
  - City of Woodstock Planning Department
  - City of Woodstock Engineering Department
  - City of Woodstock Downtown Development Officer
  - StreetScape Consulting Firm (Planning Urban Design and Landscape Architecture)

# **Current Condition**



Council has deferred the StreetScape master plan until March for City Staff to come back with cost-saving options, and for a survey to be conducted to seek public input.



Council's concerns / reasons for the deferral included:

- Overall cost and impact to taxpayers
- Street was re-paved a short while ago
- Oxford County increased tax impact to Woodstock taxpayers

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The physical condition of the current streetscape and Museum Square negatively impacts the vibrancy of the Downtown. From an accessibility standpoint, the current streetscape causes barriers for those with physical limitations.

#### Gaps / Problems

Several elements of the StreetScape plan include accessibility (and safety) improvements:



#### City of Woodstock's Vision and Commitment to Accessibility (from the Multi-Year Accessibility Plan)

- > To promote public awareness and sensitivity towards all persons with disabilities;
- > To encourage co-operation between all service and interest groups;
- > To identify and document relevant matters and concerns;
- To create a community that provides opportunities for barrier-free access to transportation, programming, recreation, and other City services;
- > To embrace the concept of universal design to include both persons with disabilities and the aging population;
- To ensure that policies and practices are maintained in relation to the development and redevelopment of services and facilities that incorporates persons with disabilities and aging population statistics;
- To ensure that the City receives the maximum economic benefits from building an accessible City;
- > To encourage public participation and civic engagement in community accessibility matters.





The Master Plan incorporated multiple suggestions provided by the various Stakeholder groups that were consulted:

Comments and insights by the above various stakeholders were often aligned with the feedback received from the public through the open houses and surveys conducted.



# Analysis

- A set of goals were established for the project based on the important feedback received from stakeholders and special interest groups. These goals included the following regarding accessibility:
  - The downtown should be accessible to all and should consider those with physical, mental and financial limitations.
- > Section 3.6.3 (Page 42) of the Master Plan states:
  - All aspects of the streetscape shall be designed to be accessible to persons living with disabilities and must comply with the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act [AODA] and its regulations including the Design of Public Spaces Standards. Outlined in this section are several key public realm accessibility objectives for the Streetscape Master Plan. The primary goal of these recommendations is to ensure that the design of areas within the public realm consider users of all abilities.

### Recommendations

- Prioritizing accessibility and pedestrianfriendly initiatives in Downtown Woodstock is crucial for creating an inclusive community. By optimizing infrastructure and promoting Woodstock as a welcoming destination, we can ensure that everyone, regardless of mobility, can enjoy and engage with our vibrant urban environment.
- By staying true to the Streetscape Master Plan, we can optimize our resources, improve accessibility, and enhance the overall appeal of our community. This will ensure that Woodstock remains a vibrant and attractive place to live, work, and visit.
- In 2026 the City of Woodstock will celebrate it's 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary in tandem with Downtown Woodstock BIA's 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Let's have a GRAND RE-OPENING to celebrate!
