Introduction

The Woodstock Art Gallery collaborated with external consultants from late fall 2022 to early spring 2023 to develop a comprehensive digital strategy.

- Digital Access to Heritage grant
- RFP to hire a consultant- Bruce Wyman of USD Design | MACH Consulting, partnering with Corey Timpson of Corey Timpson Design
- COVID-19 led to virtual programming when gallery was closed
- Upon reopening, a hybrid virtual/in-person model is recommended
- Digital strategy works in tandem with the strategic plan



Process

Remote interviews with staff members were the basis for much of the assessment, alongside document, content, and database reviews.

- SWOT analysis
- Goals and Objectives
- Gallery staff were involved with the process
- Consultants offered guidance in understanding and approaching digital technologies

- We expect this digital strategy to be revisited and revised periodically


